They performed 80 surgical cases, working with a variety of surgeons, including a general surgeon, gynecologist, urologist, and a plastic • surgeon. The surgical procedures included laparoscopic cholycystectomies, hernia repairs, cleft lip and palate repairs, hysterectomies

> and prostate surgeries. Some of the patients had waited a vear or more for their surgeries.
