APS is a nonprofit devoted to fostering education, scientific research, and dissemination of information in the physiological sciences. The Society was founded in 1887 with 28 members. APS now has over 10,500 members. Most members have doctoral degrees in physiology and/or medicine.

Research finds air quality in Acadiana bars hazardous

nalysis of research data led by Daniel Harrington, ScD, Assistant Professor

A of Public Health in Environmental and Occupational Health Sciences, for a study conducted by Louisiana Campaign for Tobacco-Free Living has found that the air in bars and clubs in the Lafayette area contains "very unhealthy" and "hazardous" levels of pollutants. The study assessed the impact of environmental tobacco smoke on indoor air quality by measuring air pollution in 22 Lafayette-area bars where smoking is allowed. The health effects associated with the "hazardous" level of exposure include serious risk of respiratory effects in the general population, and significant aggravation of heart or lung disease and premature death in people with cardiopulmonary disease and the elderly.

Seventy-seven percent of the bars sampled - 17 of 22 - had "unhealthy," "very unhealthy," or "hazardous" air quality levels according to US Environmental Protection Agency standards.

The researchers concluded this study provides solid, scientific evidence that bar employees, as well as musicians and entertainers who play in bars are breathing unhealthy air on a regular basis.
