

Library Resource Guide for NURS2371 Introduction to Professional Nursing

Three publications will be used throughout Nursing School. They are statements from the American Nurses Association; they are not available in an electronic format. The Library keeps copies on Reserve but you really need to have them on your bookshelf. They are:

Every professional has a bookshelf and in addition to the above mentioned books, yours needs to include a good **medical or nursing dictionary**. The Library provides access to Stedman's *Medical Dictionary* and through Mosby's Nursing Consult to *Mosby's Dictionary of Medicine, Nursing & Health Professions* but you will also need to have a printed dictionary. If you would like to look at a few dictionaries to help you decide which one to purchase, you can find them in the Library [Reference](#) section with the call number [W 13](#).

For your history of nursing paper, it is frequently necessary to obtain some background on your topic from your textbook or from one of the general nursing history books listed in your Syllabus or in the Library's collection. Some of these are:

Dolan, J. A., Fitzpatrick, M.L., & Hermann, E.K. (1983). *Nursing in society: A historical perspective* (15th ed). Philadelphia, PA: Saunders. [Reserve WY 11 D68 1983] Other books by Josephine Dolan may also be helpful.

Goodnow, M. (1948). *Nursing history* (8th ed.). Philadelphia, PA: Lippincott. [Reserve WY 11 G62 1948] This is a classic and may be helpful for looking at the earlier years of nursing.

This book also contains a chapter on doing research in nursing history.

Kalisch, P. A., & Kalisch, B. J. (2004). *American nursing: A history* (4th ed.). Philadelphia, PA: Lippincott Williams & Wilkins. [Reserve WY 11 AA1 K12a 2004] The 2nd and 3rd editions are called *The Advance of American Nursing* and are available in the Library . [WY 11 AA1 K12a]

Lagemann, E. C. (Ed.). (1983). *Nursing history: New perspectives, new possibilities*. New York, NY: Teachers College, Columbia University. [Reserve WY 11 L13n 1981]

Stewart, I. M., & Austin, A. L. (1962). *A history of nursing, from ancient to modern times; A world view* (5th ed.). New York, NY: Putnam. [WY 11 St4h 1962]

In 1912 Adelaide Nutting and Lavinia Lloyd Dock published a four volume work, *A history of nursing: The evolution of nursing systems from the earliest times to the foundations of the first English and American training schools for nurses*. A shorter version of it has been published as *A short history of nursing: From the earliest times to the present day* [Reserve WY 11 D65].

With survey history books, sometimes an earlier edition may treat certain topics more fully. Do not hesitate to check an earlier edition or two if you have trouble finding general information on your topic. Use of Wikipedia is discouraged.

- **Don't forget** to utilize the reference list or bibliography at the end of whichever resources you do use. It can lead you to other resources.

A WARNING, many of our historical materials are on microfiche. For this assignment I believe that you will be able to find enough print and electronic material without having to resort to these cumbersome microforms. I hope that you will cultivate an interest in the history of nursing and will eventually be able to take advantage of this collection.

Some of you have people as the topics of your paper. We have some **biographical dictionaries** which may be helpful. The first is a three-volume set edited by Vern L. Bullough called *American Nursing: a Biographical Dictionary* [Reference WZ 112 Am35].

Volume I covers people

- who died before 1987 or 1988 or
- who were born before 1890.

Volume II covers people

- who are not in volume I
- who died before 1991 or 1992 or
- who were born before 1916.

Volume III covers people

- who are not in volumes I or II,
- who were born before 1926 or
- who died before 1999 or 2000.

The second is also a biographical dictionary, the *Dictionary of American Nursing Biography* edited by Martin Kaufman [Reference WZ 112 K16d 1988]. It includes people who died before 31 January 1987.

And if your person is a **nursing theorist**, I suggest starting with *Nursing theorists and their work* by Ann Marriner Tomey & Martha Raile Alligood. The 7th edition (2010) is on Reserve [WY 86 M34n 2010]. The earlier editions, especially the 5th, have fuller treatments of some of the theorists [WY 86 M34n] and can be checked out. If you use an older resource, you must also determine if your theorist has died since it was published. Obituaries can be a rich source of information.

Once you have obtained an overview of your topic, you will want to use the journal articles that can be found in the databases CINAHL and PubMed. Both of these databases have a “history” subheading that can be used with the primary topic of your search.

Some of the **journals** that specialize in publishing articles on nursing history are the *Journal of Nursing History* and *Nursing History Review*.

Many nursing history **books** can be found on the 4th floor of the Library beginning with the call numbers WY 11 and WZ 112. Browsing these sections may prove helpful.
