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Quality Training to Improve Performance (Q-TIP)

American Journal of Medical Quality Call for Articles

The *American Journal of Medical Quality (AJMQ)* recognizes that opportunities to learn about the perspectives of professionals in training are limited. To expand learning opportunities for its readership, *AJMQ* launched a column dedicated to publishing student work on the topic of performance improvement in 2013. Through collaboration with the American College of Medical Quality the 2018 solicitation is now open for articles for the column, "Quality Training to Improve Performance (Q-TIP)," which will be published in issues of *AJMQ* 2020. Up to two articles will be published in each issue.

The column may be written by health professions students from any discipline (e.g., medicine, nursing, pharmacy, physical therapy, occupational therapy, allied health) and should highlight trainee-initiated improvement work and interprofessional collaborations. Both students and clinical trainees are eligible. You are eligible if you were in school or training through June 30, 2019. The column must be no more than 550 words in length including references.

Article submissions should be sent electronically to the faculty advisor and Editorial Board member, Mary Reich Cooper, MD, JD (<u>mary.r.cooper@jefferson.edu</u>) by September 1, 2019. The guidelines for the articles are <u>here</u>. Articles will be selected by an Editorial Advisory Board that includes students. Up to twelve articles will be published (two articles per issue) in *AJMQ* during the 2020 publication cycle.
