

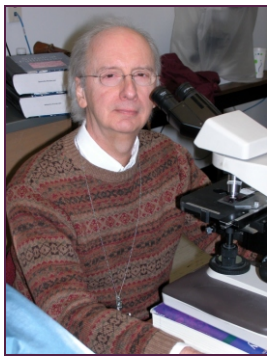

Division of Administration report presented to Supervisors

Facility Planning and Control in the Division of Administration for the State of Louisiana engaged a consultant to review the proposal for a new hospital in New Orleans. Director Jerry Jones presented their findings to the LSU Board of Supervisors at their meeting on Thursday. The consultants concur with LSU that New Orleans needs to have a new University Hospital, but recommend a larger hospital than we have been planning. In their report,

the consultants said that while LSU has proposed a 350-bed hospital, the data indicate that New Orleans will actually need to have more than 400 additional beds in order to handle projected patient needs. This is in addition to the 200 beds that VA is planning for their patients. LSU plans to meet with the LRA next Thursday seeking \$300 million in block grants to start land acquisition and planning for the new facility.

Allied Health student project helps children read
