Legislative vote moves plans for LSU-VA hospital forward

The Joint Legislative Committee on the Budget voted today to allocate \$74 million to be used now for land acquisition and planning of the new LSU-VA teaching hospital in downtown New Orleans. The remaining \$226 million of Community Development Block Grant funding will be released pending approval of the business plan.



The vote was almost unanimous. We are grateful to the

Legislature and the Governor for their understanding of the importance of this new teaching hospital not only to the people of New Orleans, but also to the entire state.

Our graduate medical education programs educate and train Louisiana's professional health workforce and a modern teaching hospital is crucial to our success in that mission. This new hospital will also improve our ability to care for the uninsured and medically under-served in the this area and will be a vital part of the recovery of New Orleans and health infrastructure.
