LSUHSC programs rank nationally

Ur graduate programs in Nursing and Allied Health Professions have ranked nationally in the 2008 edition of US News & World Report's America's Best Graduate Schools.



Audiology, which admitted its inaugural class in 2004, ranked in the top 24 programs. The Physical Therapy doctoral program, whose first class began last year, ranked in the top 74. Rehabilitation Counseling ranked in the top 39. Our Speech-Language Pathology program ranked in the top 45, and Occupational Therapy ranked in the top 71.

Our Nurse Anesthesia program, also relatively new, ranked in the top 42, and the Master's Nursing program ranked in the top 141.
