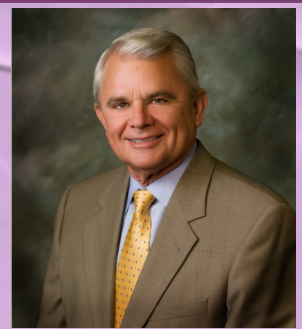

BOS approves LSU hospital board members

At its meeting today, the LSU Board of Supervisors confirmed the appointments of two prominent citizens and two members of the LSU Board of Supervisors nominated by Dr. John Lombardi to serve as LSU's representatives on the non-profit board that will manage operations of the new University Medical Center in New Orleans.



The four LSU nominees are: Elaine Abell, a Lafayette attorney and funeral home president; Dr. Byron Harrell, president of Baptist Community Ministries, a health-oriented foundation based in New Orleans; Bobby Yarborough, co-owner of Manda Fine Meats in Baton Rouge; and Rod West of New Orleans, executive vice president and chief administrative officer of Entergy Corporation.

The state has committed about \$775 million in state funds and an award against FEMA for construction of the new academic medical center.

Cancer research summer program grows health careers

The longest-running summer research program funded by the NCI in the country wrapped up this afternoon with poster presentations highlighting the research projects of this year's 21 participants. The goal of the *Short Term Experiences in Cancer Research Program* under the direction of Dr. John Estrada, is to increase the number of health professionals, especially those from underrepresented minorities, who will pursue careers in cancer.
