The Health Research Council (HRC) of New Zealand invited Dr. Richard Scribner, the D'Angelo

Professor of Alcohol Research at L S U Health Sciences Center N e w Orleans School of




Public Health, to review grant applications for its 2011 Annual Contestable Funding Round. The HRC is the Crown agency responsible for managing the Government's investment in health research.

Dr. Scribner reviewed the pool of HRC grant applications focused on the distribution of alcohol outlets in New Zealand and what their relationship may be to a variety of health problems.

As Chairman of the National Institutes of Health Community Influences on Health Behavior Study Section, Dr. Scribner reviews numerous grant applications for research on the influence that neighborhood environments have on health behaviors leading to chronic disease in society.

LSUHSC Pharmacology earns national recognition

member of the faculty in Pharmacology and a postdoctoral fellow will be awarded national honors at the upcoming High Blood Pressure Research Conference jointly sponsored by the InterAmerican Society of Hypertension (IASH) and the American Heart Association Councils. Both are working on the role of ACE2 in the brain in the regulation of high blood pressure.

Dr. Huijing Xia, Instructor-Research in Pharmacology, has been selected to receive an IASH New Investigator Award. Her research has found that ACE2 in the brain is reduced during the development of hypertension and that maintenance of high ACE2 levels in the brain helps in preventing the development of hypertension.

Postdoctoral Fellow Srinivas Sriramula, PhD, has been selected to receive the

Annual High Blood Pressure Research Conference New Investigator Award by the American Heart Association. Dr. Sriramula's research shows that salt-induced hypertension is associated with high sympathetic drive (nerve discharge) and release of vasopressin from the brain. In addition, maintenance of high

ACE2 levels in the brain reduce these components, leading to the reduction of hypertension.
