
Flu shots given on campus next week

Iu shots will be offered on the main LSUHSC campus beginning next week. The immunizations will be given on October 5th, 6th, 7th, and 12th, from 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. in room 5B12 at the LSUHSC School of Nursing.



The immunizations are free to LSUHSC students. There will be a \$15 charge for LSUHSC faculty and staff payable by check or money order made out to LSUHSC-NO.

Annual flu vaccines are recommended for most people 6 months and older. It takes about two weeks after vaccination for your body to develop an immune response. In the United States, influenza season usually begins in October.

Vaccination is especially important for people at higher risk of severe influenza and their close contacts, including healthcare personnel and close contacts of children younger than 6 months.
